
St Monica: Prayer, Perseverance and Patience

E Waste – by Sophie T (6F)

In an era where nearly every household in Australia owns at least one mobile or electronic device, it gets very easy to overlook how much e-waste we generate. In fact, we change our gadgets as often as we buy new clothes.

So what is e-waste? E waste is discarded, or throw out electronics. It can be CD players, computers or laptops, printers, televisions, mobile phones, pretty much any electronic device. On average a family of five in Australia produces 140 kilos of e-waste every year. The most commonly thrown out things from families include mobile phones (most that still work), unused refrigerators, hundreds and hundreds of cables, the list goes on and on.

So where can e-waste be recycled? There are currently 27 places in Canberra and New South Wales where e-waste can be recycled. So why recycle e-waste? Recycling e-waste will reduce landfill, protect the air and waterways and reduce greenhouse gas. 85% of e-waste that is sent to either landfill or shipped overseas to countries such as China, India and Pakistan is burned. This releases her full gasses into the air, which can sometimes be fatal if a young child inhales too much. One of the main reasons that China's air is so polluted is not only because there are many places that produce gasses, but because there is so much e-waste burning.

E-waste is on the landfill blacklist. Any e-waste that is not shipped or burned is sent straight to landfill, where it is able to avoid decomposition forever. Any glass that might be in the device takes 1-2 years to decompose, and any plastics may take up to 1 million years to break down, but most parts in electronic devices just don't break down at all. This means that if we stop landfill soon, in around two-million years, there will be a whole lot of e-waste in the ground.

There are some places around the world that are trying to fix the problem of e-waste. Some places are taking e-waste from side walks, which is legal in Victoria, and seeing if it is able to be fixed. If it is able to be fixed, they fix it then send it back to the owners house. If they want it, they can keep it. If not it is sold at a market or an Op Shop. If not it is taken a part, and all the precious metal is removed, then the rest is broken apart and used to make something else. One place in Victoria, called The Bower, is a café with a

workshop at the back. People can take broken things such as computers, blenders and baby toys, as well as household items such as furniture, and the people who work there will teach you how to fix it. If it is unable to be fixed, it is broken apart, similar to many other places around the world, and made into something new.



So in conclusion, e-waste is a big problem, not only in Australia, but all around the world. In fact, we generate so much as you can probably see, e-waste is one of the fastest growing problems in the world today.
